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Meet The Trustees

Dr. Humphreys, President

Not everyone realizes that Humphreys College is a non-profit, California corporation, serving in the public benefit. As such, there are no owners or stockholders of the college, as would be the case if it were a "for profit" organization. Rather, the college is governed by a 15-member board of trustees which is responsible for the overall operation and management of the college. The Board has a nominating committee which makes recommendations for board memberships which are then voted on by the full board. The board of trustees is a critical aspect of the overall organizational structure of the college. A brief description of the board members follows so that you may...MEET THE TRUSTEES.

Judge Laurence Drivon is the Chairman of the board. He is a former district attorney of San Joaquin County and Municipal Court Judge. Vice-Chair is Ronald Guntert Jr., President of Guntert and Zimmerman of Ripon, which manufactures and sells heavy-road and canal-building equipment which is sold world wide. Secretary of the board is Dr. Reuben Smith, former professor and dean of the graduate school at U.O.P. Katherine Williams is the treasurer of the board and is a C.P.A. as well as an attorney.

Other board members include Joel Harrison, one of the co-founders of Quantum Corporation of Milpitas. Quantum is a multi-billion-dollar-a-year international company which manufactures disk drives and other computer equipment. Gary Hill is a court reporter in San Francisco, and in addition to having his own firm, he is in charge of all court reporters in the courts of San Francisco. Valerie Hubbard is a recent graduate of Humphreys College and is the vice president for sales at local radio station KQOD. Ort Lofthus is former owner and general manager of radio station KJOY here in Stockton and was a principal in the first cable television system in the Central Valley.

Dr. Chaiho Kim is a professor in the business school at University of Santa Clara and has served that institution as department chair, chair of the Ph.D. program, and currently is responsible for the entire academic computing system for the business school. Robert Humphreys is president of the college. Roy Sanders is a retired senior vice president of the Bank of Stockton. June Potter is retired registrar and admissions counselor for the college and has been associated with the college since the late 1940's. Dr. Lynette Hart is a medical doctor and is a radiology specialist at St. Joseph's Hospital.

There are currently two vacancies on the board, which are expected to be filled at the next meeting of the board in March.


